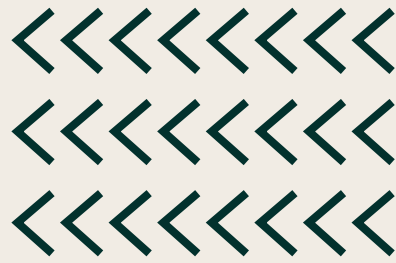

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New Parish Council 2024/25 Budget

Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Council develops new strategy and sets budget for 2024-25.



Over the past six months, Officers, and Councillors, with support from CHALC (Cheshire Association of Local Councils) have been working on a new strategy for Shavington-cum-Gresty to meet the increasing demands of the growing Parish.

The current Parish Councillors, elected in May 2023, include a number of new Councillors (33.3%). As the majority of Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Councillors are not affiliated with a political party, there is no set direction or manifesto for the Parish Council to work towards, unlike larger Councils, for example: Crewe Town Council. This means that each Councillor comes to the table with their own views on what a Parish Council could, or should, do, on an item-by-item basis.

Councillors, therefore, must agree on an approach to delivering utmost value for the residents of Shavington-cum-Gresty and have agreed to do so by forming a Strategic Plan for the next 5+ years.

The number of houses in the Parish of Shavington-cum-Gresty has increased by around 47% over the last two election terms (since 2015) and, with such changes, this brings new challenges and new priorities - requiring the Parish Council to be nimble and adapt.

Shavington-cum-Gresty is not a small Parish Council in terms of size, the budget they have and how active they are in the community.

Part of strategic planning is transitioning the Parish Council from thinking about a budget in yearly activities and moving to a long-term approach where they consider a 3-5 year financial plan.

One of the bigger projects the Parish Council is progressing is to take over around eight acres of land in Gresty which is currently a wildlife area to maintain it as such for the Parish for generations to come.

The strategic planning process has, therefore, meant additional sums of money have been allocated to account for some of the new projects that the Parish Council are currently considering. Further details of these projects will be shared with residents as they are agreed over the coming months.

The first impact residents will see is on their upcoming Council Tax bill for 2024-25 which will show an increase in the Parish precept line.

The Parish precept is the amount that households contribute towards the funds of their Parish Council to cover the cost of statutory duties and any planned expenditure.

The increase in the Parish precept is set to be 25%, which equates to 34p per week per B and D property. Over the whole Parish this is an additional £52,661 into the Parish Council budget.



Councillor Benjamin Gibbs, Chairman of Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Council, commented:

“Over the past few years we have welcomed thousands of new people into our Parish. The size of Shavington-cum-Gresty has grown substantially since I first joined the Parish Council in 2015. As with all organisations that scale quickly, change is needed to ensure we remain lean and operate efficiently to serve our ever-growing community.”

Bike Safe

PCSO Walley held a Bike Marking event in January. Residents brought their cycles to be registered for the free of charge initiative. Registering the bike on the program means you could be reunited with your bike in the event of it being stolen, but it does not help make it a hard target to thieves.

Operation Park Safe

Residents in the Crewe Local Policing Unit area will now be able to report public illegal parking problems directly to the Cheshire Police website.

You will be able to upload videos and photographs of offending vehicles where they will be assessed by an experienced traffic offices, who will deal with any dangerous parking offences.

You will also need to provide a written statement about the offence online - including the date and time it happened.

Do NOT challenge the driver or put yourself at risk to obtain a photograph.

Any minor traffic obstructions or community impact issues will be allocated to the local PCSO or Beat officers.

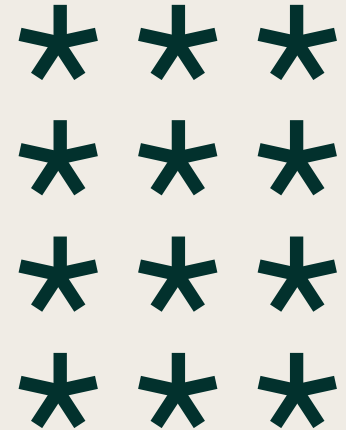
Who can join the Clean Team?

You will need strong shoes and gardening gloves if you have them, otherwise disposable gloves will be provided.

I can't attend on Saturdays so what can I do to help?

We ask that residents, please, continue to keep our Parish clean and tidy by cutting back overgrown trees and hedges which obstruct the pavement and try to keep the front of your property weed free.

We encourage residents to, safely, pick up any litter dropped outside their property and help to make our Parish a cleaner place.



Following the success of the #QueenBee community project run by the Parish Council in 2022 and conscious of the community appetite to improve and enhance green spaces in the parish, Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Council has successfully secured National Lottery Community funding of £10,000 for our new project 'IMPACT - every leaf counts'.

With 'IMPACT - every leaf counts', the Parish Council aims to create and enhance the biodiversity in the area with an emphasis on improving pollinator habitats, and to raise awareness and empower residents with taking ownership of green spaces in the parish.



The project aims to:

- **Leaf 1:** Revamp existing green spaces with pollinator-friendly plants.
- **Leaf 2:** Convert disused phone kiosks into community vertical herb gardens.
- **Leaf 3:** Establish a group of volunteers to look after green areas in the parish.
- **Leaf 4:** Cultivate environmental awareness with a series of garden coffee meetings.
- **Leaf 5:** Promote opportunities for people to meet and connect with others who share similar interests or values, to help build social networks and strengthen relationships within the community.

The Parish Council will support community groups to work together to deliver/arrange/present educational talks and workshops on environmental issues that directly affect the parish.

The Parish Council will help these community groups to promote these opportunities within the local community and encourage new membership.

The purpose of this is to create an awareness of the environmental support that people attending these groups can assist with on a local level. They will also create opportunities for people to meet and connect with others who share similar interests or values. It is hoped that this signposting will help build social networks and strengthen existing relationships within the community. This can help to reduce social isolation and create support for those facing challenges or difficulties helping to build a sense of community which can help enhance personal growth and well-being.

UPDATE

Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Council is pleased to announce that through the Impact project they have successfully completed the following:

Coronation Gardens

The rose beds in the Jubilee gardens were rejuvenated to celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III. New roses were planted in the centre of these beds and bulbs have been planted around the flowerbeds to ensure some colour in spring.



Bulb Planting

The call to help plant bulbs in the community was well received and we were grateful to the members of the community that came to plant the spring bulbs. The bulbs were funded as a part of our National Lottery Community funding and we are pleased that they will provide additional colour to the Parish this spring.



New Planters in Gresty

The Planters opposite Gresty Lane, outside Hickory's Smokehouse were the next task to be undertaken. These flower beds had become severely overgrown and then, after being cut back, were left unattended. Shavington-cum-Gresty Parish Council wanted to improve this focal point for residents and sought permission to reinstate these flowerbeds.



We were grateful for the support from Keltbray as they dedicated two of their community volunteer days to the project. The team worked so hard, working through a very wet first day! Staff from Hickory's Smokehouse also supported the project providing refreshments as well as involving themselves in the planting sessions. The Cheshire Wildlife Trust kindly provided us with advice and ideas for planting as we tried to select plants that would encourage wildlife habitats and provide sources of pollen for bees, butterflies, and birds.



CURRENT ACTIVITIES

The following activities have taken place or are currently taking place through the Impact project funding:

Phone Kiosks

At the time of this newsletter, the refurbishing process for the phone kiosks is well underway. The vision of turning these spaces into Community Herb Gardens is becoming a reality, and we anticipate a beautiful and functional addition to our community.

The artistic touch to our Community Herb Gardens is being provided by Nonna Glass, whose expertise in mosaic artwork is well-regarded. During recent Impact Community coffee sessions, community members were invited to actively contribute to the mosaic artworks that will adorn the kiosks. This collaborative effort not only adds a personal touch to the project but also symbolises the unity and creativity within our community.

In an inspiring collaboration, designs for the mosaic artworks were selected from the creative work of children at Shavington Primary School. The colourful and imaginative contributions from our youngest community members are sure to bring a sense of joy and playfulness to the Herb Gardens, enhancing the overall aesthetic appeal of the kiosks to everyone.

As the refurbishment nears completion, we want to highlight the community-centric aspect of this project. Once the Herb Gardens are fully established, we encourage all community members to utilise the herbs



grown in the phone kiosks. This will transform the Herb Gardens into a valuable community resource, where everyone can enjoy the benefits of fresh herbs while fostering a sense of shared ownership and responsibility.

We look forward to witnessing the transformation of the phone kiosks into vibrant Community Herb Gardens and hope that this initiative becomes a much-enjoyed space for everyone in our community.



Coffee Sessions

Shavington Village Festival Committee's Pantomime

Forty-Seven years ago, Ken Jones, a villager in Shavington, invited all local organisations to a meeting in the local scout hut to discuss how the village was going to celebrate the Queen's Silver Jubilee. As usual on such occasions, the meeting was sparsely attended, but those who did attend more than made up in enthusiasm and commitment for the lack of numbers, with the result that a committee was formed to organise a Village Festival in the summer of 1977.

From the outset, the Committee decided that the prime objective of the festival would be to create the opportunity for local organisations to raise funds. This was done particularly well.

From the Festival, the idea of a village pantomime was born, with Babes in the Wood being staged at the Leisure Centre in February 1979. This proved to be so successful, both artistically and financially, that it too became an annual event, involving over 150 adults and children on stage and behind the scenes, and being watched by an annual audience of around 1500.





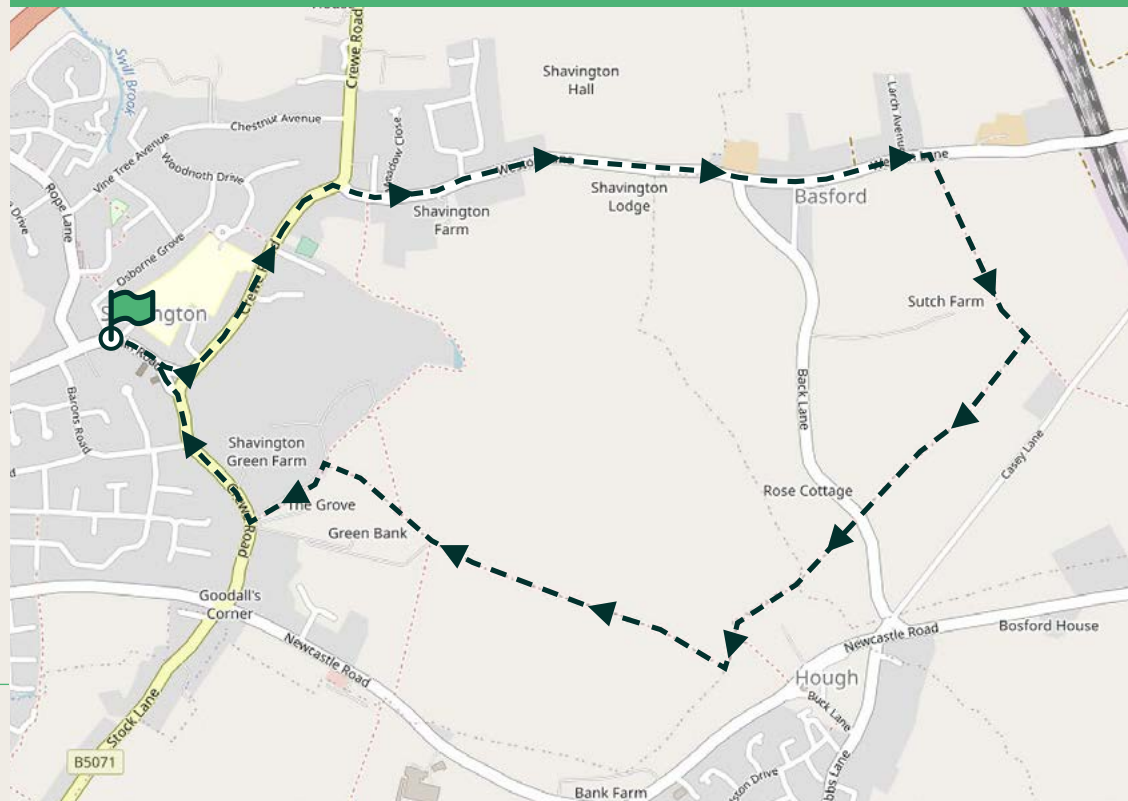

Brownies

Spotlight on... Brownies

When mentioning the term Brownies, most people either think of a lovely chocolate dessert or have visions of dancing and singing around toadstools. Brownies have always been an integral part of Shavington community which once boasted two different Brownie packs and a Girl Guides unit. 2nd Shavington Brownies was established in 1975 following on from the oversubscribed 1st Shavington Brownies, which then later merged with 2nd Shavington Brownies. The Guides group also merged with Wistaston due to dwindling numbers.

In 1909 a group of girls appeared at a Scout Rally asking the founder, Lord Baden Powell, to make something similar for girls. Girlguiding was then created under the leadership of Agnes Baden-Powell (Lord Baden Powell's sister). Guides used to meet at weekends, going on long hikes and taking part in activities outside. They found that their younger sisters would often want to join in but couldn't keep pace with the older girls. Therefore, in 1914, a younger section was introduced called Rosebuds. The girls didn't like the name and asked for it to be changed. Brownies was then suggested due to its link with magical creatures (a Brownie is a type of fairy, like a pixie or imp).



Brownies in the UK, and in turn Girlguiding, has seen some major changes across the years. The activities Brownies took part in were mostly based on life skills a girl would need to know at the time, such as helping around the house, sewing and cleaning. I think most women can remember doing their 'Hostess badge'! In 2003 there was an overhaul of the brown triangular badges and instead yellow diamond badges were introduced. These badges kept some of the traditional skills but introduced new computer and science badges.

In 2019, Girlguiding introduced another large change designed to integrate all 4 sections (Rainbows, Brownies, Guides and Rangers) and make the programme flow throughout the sections, growing with the girls. Although some of the badges still look back in history and teach the girls 'traditional' life skills, the new programme offers new and important experiences for girls. This introduced new badges based around 6 themes- Know Myself, Express Myself, Be Well, Have Adventures, Take Action and Skills for my Future. The Brownies can now work on interest badges at home including inventing, aviation, speaking out and mindfulness. The new programme encourages them to work towards theme awards and has final goals of Bronze, Silver and Gold awards.



2nd Shavington Brownies jumped straight into the new programme, being led by the girls who choose the badges they want to complete. During the Covid-19 pandemic, 2nd Shavington Brownies turned to virtual sessions, taking part in cook-alongs, badge work, science experiments and even virtual trips to London and 3 virtual sleepovers! Once lockdown had been lifted, the Brownies had record numbers and a sizeable waiting list.

At 2nd Shavington Brownies, we keep a balanced mix of tradition and newer activities. Our Brownies still make their promise by following the Brownie story, working in Sixes with their Sixer and Secondar guiding them to the toadstool and 'pond' and saying the memorable rhyme - *'Twist me and turn me and show me the elf, I looked in the water and there saw... myself'*. They have a Brownie buddy to teach them the little traditions that make Brownies special, the leaders are known as Owls and we still sing 'Brownie Bells' at the end of each meeting. The Brownies signify their moving up to Guides by jumping over the toadstool, harking back to the days of the Golden Hand badge, where a Brownie would be awarded her 'Brownie wings' and would 'fly up' to Guides.

Our recent adventures include camping, a 'Harry Potter' themed pack holiday, a sleepover in a science museum, zipwire, learning beatboxing and of course lots of arts and crafts! Our Brownies are very motivated with the majority achieving their Brownie Gold award before they finish Brownies and some even completing every single badge available! We are currently working on a badge with links to STEM activities, which the girls are enjoying very much. We also have a 1920s night planned, which we carry out in the dark with tealights and we learn and try older Brownie activities, games and songs. We think that community is an important part of Brownies, especially in a village such as ours, so we encourage all the Brownies to take part in at least one community element each year. The Brownies are very proud to take part in community events and be seen as an integral part of Shavington's youth programme.

Local Fundraising Hero

HISTORICAL

SHAVINGTON-CUM-GRESTY

This edition of our newsletter continues our 'Historical Shavington-cum-Gresty' Series, in which we would like to share the history of Shavington-cum-Gresty with the parish.

In this edition of the newsletter we include our final extract from the booklet '100 years of Education in Shavington' by L.A. Barnett.

This centenary booklet was written to celebrate 100 years of education in Shavington from 1875 to 1975. Mr Barnett was Headteacher of Shavington Primary school.





The Last Quarter

During the last 25 years, in the 'History of Education in Shavington' booklet focuses on the many changes that took place to what we now refer to as the 'old school' building. In the spring of 1951 when Mr Dodd retired Mr L.A. Barnett became headmaster. There were now two separate schools in the village; the Mid School for children aged 7 to 15 with 170 children on roll; and the Infant School with 70 children on roll in two classes. The number of children attending the Mid School had been slowly increasing during the late 40s, and in September 1951 there were 190 on roll. An additional teacher was allocated the school, and as there were no classrooms for this teacher to occupy, the St. John's Sunday schoolroom was hired as an additional classroom and first used on August the 29th 1951.

In 1952 Miss Hallam, the headmistress of the Infant School retired. There were very few applicants for her post and no appointment was made. After much discussion, the Ministry of Education finally consented to the two schools being joined together so that from the beginning of the summer term 1953 there was an all-age school in Shavington with 279 children on roll. On the 21st of April 1958, the Shavington Secondary Modern School

was opened and all senior pupils from the Shavington all age school moved up to this new school.

Now begins the period when the school buildings were known as the Shavington County Primary School, a school with 209 children on roll. The County Primary school had a life of 14 years. During the first four years things went smoothly along, but in the 5th to the 7th years a gradual increase in the number on roll occurred, and at the end of the 8th year there were 50% more children on roll than they had in April 1958. The Sunday school, that was vacated when the Secondary School was opened, was brought back into use again due to the many accommodation problems caused by the huge increase in children.

This was not only a time of change as far as accommodation and transfers were concerned, the wind of change blew through the classroom also. It was necessary to have a school fund and in early 1950s the school

had very successful fundraisers such as jumble sales and Whist drives which helped to provide money for additional items at the school. The house system was also initiated during this period with the house names Clive, Rhodes and Wolfe. Competition between the houses took place on the sports field and then within the classroom, as striving for merit stars proved an interesting incentive to the children.



There was clean competition on the allotment fields between the groups of boys working on them for the gardening prize awarded annually. In 1956 the allotment had to be abandoned and the area was seeded ready for the creation of a school playing field. The four large air raid shelters were dismantled and a paved area, to be used as a playground, was created. In the 60s the school field began to be fully used not only for games periods and midday activities but also for country dancing, Maypole dancing and the annual sports day competition for the shield and cup was also very popular.

In the history of the school other items are worthy of mention. The school was first provided with the telephone in March 1960 along with clerical assistance in 1959. Hot water geysers were installed in June 1964 and the lollipop lady took up her duties in October 1966.

In September 1966 the demountable classrooms were ready for use, and the two upper junior classes moved across the road. These proved to be insufficient. The county had previously bought the house known as 'The Laurels' adjacent to the demountable classrooms. This was house was now demolished, and on this site in 1969 a further mobile classroom was cited. The school now had ten classes of 360 children on roll and official swimming lessons appeared on the timetable for junior children.

Still the number of children entering the school increased and the new Infant School came just in time. In 1972 it would have been impossible to admit any more children to the buildings as they were. With very mixed feelings, the teachers said goodbye to the infant children and staff at the end of spring term 1972 and they transferred to the new open plan building called Shavington county Infant School and Shavington County Junior School came into being.

This is the last instalment from the booklet, however in the next editions we would like to continue the history of schooling in Shavington-cum-Gresty with the help of any former staff or pupils who have photographs or information that they would like to share with us.
